SILVANUS OPOT, Chemistry teacher, NIS Ch&B, Petropavlovsk Kenyan in Siberia,

Abstract: Arriving for work in Petropavlovsk was scary at the beginning. However, I now feel like an adopted member of this community.

Abstract: I have been working with state school teachers very closely for several years. In my experience, these are the people who have a heart for service to others. It is great and admirable BUT I think at times teachers take their commitment too far and become overly self-sacrificing. (I sometimes receive work- related e-mails from teachers at 3.00 in the morning!)

Being a dedicated language educator should not come at the expense of one's own wellbeing. In my talk I would like teachers to explore why wellbeing is so important and what we need to focus on to stay happy and energetic!

Plenary talk: Developing Thinking Routines

Abstract: In this interactive session we discuss 'visible thinking' and how it can foster richer discussion, more purposeful thinking and a deeper understanding of

content in the language class. We discuss these thinking routines and show how establishing them has clear benefits for our students.

One of the most important of these is the development of learner agency in applying creativity and critical thinking while learning a language. The process encourages students to structure and reveal their thinking while using language in authentic and spontaneous ways. If we use these processes as routines in our daily practice, students will be able to internalise them and apply them to different text types / genres and skills-based language activities while practising new vocabulary and structure in a meaningful way.
